



The New England Historical and Genealogical Register, the Oldest Genealogical Journal in America, Appears in a New Format

New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS) Announces Changes in Content and Design of the "Register," Its Scholarly Journal First Published in 1847

March 18, 2015—Boston, Massachusetts—A new, colorful cover on the country's oldest genealogical journal signals change. The New England Historical and Genealogical Register—the quarterly journal of New England Historic Genealogical Society (NEHGS)—appears this week in its 673 rd issue, with a new design and an important broadening of editorial focus.

In making the announcement, NEHGS President and CEO D. Brenton Simons stated, "This makes of Portsmouth [New Hampshire] in the Register even more accessible and valuable to genealogists everywhere and solidifies its place as the flagship journal of American genealogy."

The "Register," as it is frequently called, has seen relatively few changes during its many years of Hampshire Historical Society. publication spanning 168 of the 170 years of the life of NEHGS, the founding genealogical society in America. But the newest quarterly issue contains some important new features designed to encourage family historians to explore the genealogical scholarship for which the *Register* has long been known.

A full-color cover appears on the journal's most recent issue for the first time in its 168-year history. The cover of the redesigned issue this month features the print Landscape View of Portsmouth [New Hampshire] in Piscatagua River, an area related to the issue's article on the Chapouil family. Other artwork will be featured on future covers. A brief listing of each issue's entire contents now also appears on the front cover.

A modernized interior design heralds another change: an expanded editorial focus, providing genealogical content of national and international scope—while still retaining an emphasis on New England, New York State, and out-migrations from New England. NEHGS Publishing Director Penelope Stratton commented, "We had already taken a step in this direction in 2009, when we inaugurated an annual supplement, *American Ancestors Journal*, whose content we will now integrate into the quarterly issues of the *Register*. These changes reflect the NEHGS purpose, to advance the study of family history in America and beyond. And they also signal a return to the *Register*'s own roots." "We cannot but feel," the founders of NEHGS wrote in the first issue of the *Register*, "that we are performing a great service for the country at large."

Commenting on the changes, editor Henry B. Hoff, CG, FASG, said, "With a new look and an expanded focus, this is an exciting time to be editing the *Register*. We are looking forward to receiving articles on families in geographic areas that are new for us—as well as articles emphasizing the nineteenth and twentieth centuries."

Readers will note that a "Quarterly News" section has been added to the inside of the back cover, highlighting NEHGS developments of particular interest. Discerning readers might notice some minor changes in editorial style, reflecting the publisher's decision to conform with the guidelines presented in the *Guide to Genealogical Writing* (NEHGS, 2014).

The New England Historical and Genealogical Register is published by NEHGS in Winter, Spring, Summer, and Fall. All members of NEHGS have access to it in print and online at the organization's data-rich website, AmericanAncestors.org. Henry B. Hoff, CG, FASG, is Editor; Helen Schatvet Ullmann, CG, FASG, is Associate Editor. A group of consulting editors—scholars and professionals in the field of genealogy— contributes to the Register's content. Funding for its publication is provided in part by the Massachusetts Cultural Council.
